iPhone 11 Display Module Replacement Program for Touch Issues

Apple has determined that a small percentage of iPhone 11 displays may stop responding to touch due to an issue with the display module. Affected devices were manufactured between November 2019 and May 2020.

If your iPhone 11 has been exhibiting this issue, please use the serial number checker below to see if your device is eligible for this program. If so, Apple or an Apple Authorized Service Provider will provide service, free of charge.

What's New From Apple?

Next-gen Apple Silicon chips could 'significantly outpace' top Intel chips

The first M1 Macs have just hit desks and laps around the world. However, Apple's already hard at work on its next-gen Apple Silicon, Bloomberg reported Monday.

According to the report, Apple is working on "several successors" to the M1 chip. These could "significantly outpace" the performance of the top computers currently running Intel chips — including the first 32-core processor high-end Macs.

Apple's next-gen Apple Silicon will be used for next-gen MacBook Pro models, the first Apple Silicon iMac and a new Mac Pro workstation. They could be released as early as spring 2021 through to 2022, depending on the computer in question. Apple's initial next-gen designs could include as many as 16 power cores and four efficiency cores. Longer-term, Apple is "testing a chip design with as many as 32 high-performance" cores. This may be for the next Mac Pro or high-end iMacs debuting in late 2021 or early 2022.

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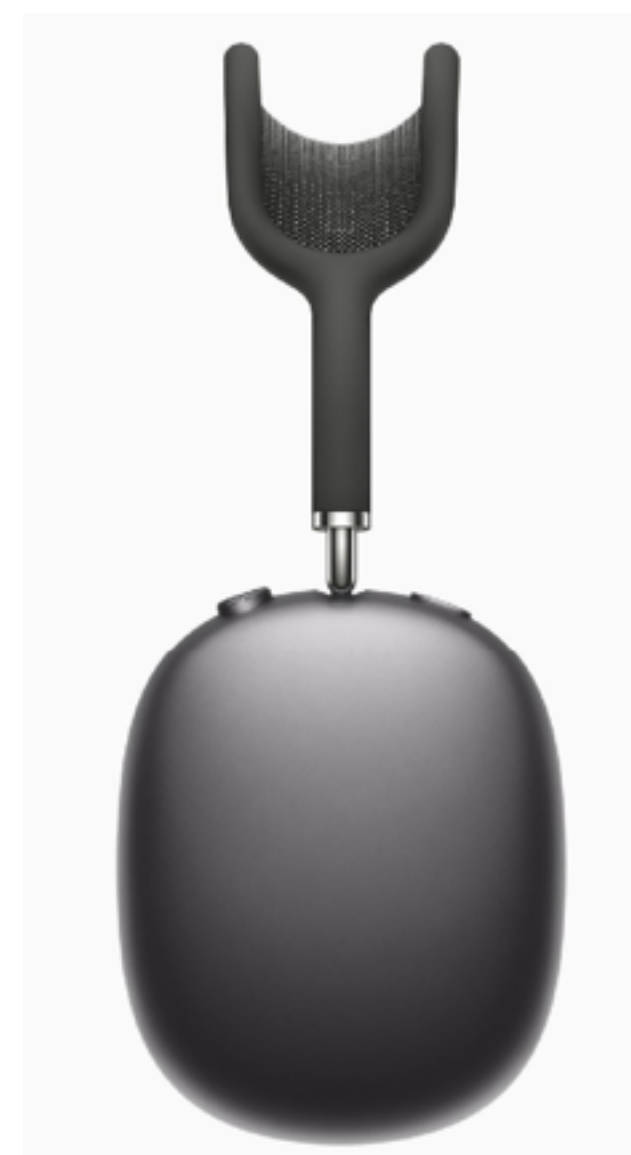

iOS 14 - Core Concepts

Sync & Backup

- 2 ways to backup - iCloud or Computer
- iCloud backup is automatic and easy but uses up your iCloud storage
- Backup to computer
 - plug device into Mac
 - The device will show up in the “Locations” section of the Finder Window SideBar
 - Clicking on the device name will show the familiar backup/sync screen from iTunes of old. Since iTunes no longer exists this window shows up in the Finder
 - Make your choices - include “Encrypt local backup” so that it included passwords and other secure information; then click Back Up Now”
- If you have a new device you can similarly plug it in and chose “Restore Backup”. A dialog box will allow you to chose which backup version to use
- Syncing allows you to download Music/Movies/TV shows/Podcasts/AudioBooks/Books/Photos and even Files that you have on your computer
- Remember to click “Apply” in the lower right after you make your choices
- You can’t sync photos if you are already using the iCloud Photo Library from the “Photos” app
- Remember, you don’t NEED any of this unless you want to minimize your iCloud Storage needs

iOS 14 - Core Concepts

Spotlight Search

- Quickly locate information stored on iOS device
- There are 2 ways to access Spotlight
 - Swipe down on any Home Screen
 - You will see a search field and under it a number of Siri suggestions
 - You can swipe right in ToDay view, even on the lock screen
- You can “tap & hold” on a result to be taken to the app or to communicate with someone in your Contacts app
- You can use Spotlight to search for current events or weather or ...

iOS 14 - Core Concepts

Siri

- Siri is your virtual assistant built into every iOS device; capable of a variety of tasks such as launch an app, set a timer, ask directions and other information
- To activate on a device with a Home Button, press and hold until you see Siri launch
- Without a home button, press and hold the sleep/wake button
- When you see the animated icon you'll know Siri is listening
- You can also animate Siri by saying "Hey Siri" if set up properly in the Siri & Search settings
 - The first time you turn Siri on with Hey Siri it will need some voice training to recognize you
 - In this same place you'll see settings to control how Siri will respond as well as the voice and language to use.
- Launching an app with Siri might be helpful if you don't remember where you stored it
- Siri is also handy for getting directions and setting alarms & timers
- You can compose and send an eMail or text by simply asking and answering questions. This can work for calendar events as well
- Simple math questions can be answered by asking.
- I like asking Siri to put items on a shared shopping list (in "Reminders app) for easy access by anyone sharing

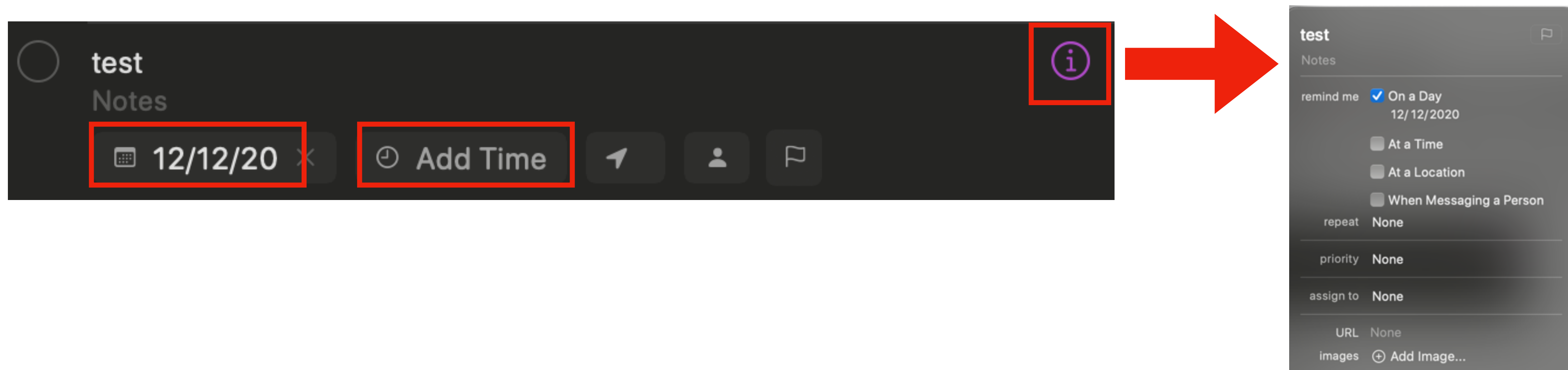
Reminders App

Introduction:

- The “Reminders” app is useful to help remember things that you don’t want to put in your calendar, but you need to do.
- It is List based and allows you to add and click off items when you have completed them
- Reminders can also be time or location based - even assigned to other you share with.
- On the top left are of the app are a set of smart lists as a convenience - This can be controlled under the “View” menu
- Below these are the lists one creates manually - any number and purpose
- At the very top of the sidebar is a search field
- You can create a new reminder by clicking the “+” at the upper right or making a choice under the “File” menu
- You can also simply click on the empty space below the current list or even use the shortcut Command + N
- You can remove a reminder by clicking the circle to the left of the reminder or swiping to the left and choosing “Delete”
- Clicking on the circle marks a reminder as completed but it remains but hidden. Clicking on the show button and the circle again “uncompleted” the reminder

Reminders App Scheduled Reminders:

- Extremely helpful addition to the list only reminders
- Create the reminder as you have learned, but then click on the “Add Date” drop down below your text. Here you can choose from some convenience date or click on custom to create a more specific date.
- After the date is chosen you will see an “Add Time” dropdown wherein you can choose or customize a time.
- Finally if it is a repeating reminder, click on the circled “i” to the right of your reminder
